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South African Tourism Celebrates Jazz Legend Hugh Masekela's Induction into the Ertegun Hall of Fame through Event at Dizzy's Club at Jazz at Lincoln Center in New York

South African Tourism, in collaboration with the Hugh Masekela Heritage Foundation, celebrated the legendary jazz musician, Hugh Masekela, at an event held at Dizzy's Club at Jazz at Lincoln Center. The event honoured Masekela's contributions to jazz music and his impact on South Africa as a cultural destination.

The highlight of the afternoon was the induction of Hugh Masekela into the Ertegun Hall of Fame, a prestigious recognition for his exceptional talent and remarkable achievements in the music industry. South African Tourism and the Hugh Masekela Heritage Foundation hosted a pre-induction reception at Jazz at Lincoln Center's Ertegun Hall of Fame which was attended by special guests, jazz enthusiasts, and journalists, who gathered to pay tribute to Masekela's legacy. 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April 2023 Freedom Day Japan activities

During April, SA Tourism has been busy executing marketing activations in China and Japan, strongly emphasising Freedom Day.

Japan

From 1 to 7 April 2023, South African Tourism hosted an in-store promotion at Tsutaya flagship bookstore in the vibrant Roppongi District of Tokyo. The promotion targeted high net-worth consumers residing in the surrounding areas of Roppongi Hills, showcasing the best of South Africa. This event is part of Tsutaya's in-store campaign to promote tourism, and SA Tourism aims to raise awareness of South Africa as an ideal travel destination for those seeking a unique sensory/spiritual reawakening experience, leaving visitors feeling inspired, enriched, and rejuvenated. On display were carefully curated books about South Africa's history and the significance of Freedom Day, including "60 Chapters to Know South Africa" by Yoichi Mine and Akashi Shoten, a Japanese journalist and South Africa expert. The book comprehensively introduces South Africa, covering its history, politics, society, and culture in 60 concise chapters.

The book starts with a brief overview of South Africa's geography and history, including the country's colonial past, the rise of apartheid, and the struggle for democracy. It then delves into the country's current political and social landscape, including its complex race relations, ongoing economic challenges, and efforts to address issues such as crime, poverty, and inequality.

The book also explores the rich cultural heritage of South Africa, including its art, music, literature, and cuisine. In addition, it highlights the country's diverse cultural influences, from the San and Zulu people's indigenous traditions to the Dutch and British colonial legacies.

Ambassador Ngonyama will send the key messages through our key media and SA Tourism's SNS to celebrate freedom in SA. It will be one of SA Tourism's key events before the May G7 summit in Hiroshima, Japan.



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April 2023 Freedom Day China activities

China (National Day)

On 27 April, South African Tourism will support the SA Embassy in Beijing, China, with key activations in Beijing. Ambassador Siyabonga Cwele will host 500 VIP guests from the diplomatic community, the Chinese government and other key stakeholders, including SA Tourism's tourism trade and media stakeholders. On the same day in Hong Kong, South African Tourism will also support the Consulate by providing branded marketing collateral to its guests.

Freedom Day is a public holiday in South Africa celebrated annually on 27 April. It commemorates the first non-racial democratic elections held in the country in 1994, which marked the end of apartheid and the beginning of a new era of freedom and democracy. Under apartheid, the government implemented a system of racial segregation and discrimination, which denied black South Africans basic rights and freedoms. The struggle against apartheid was long and difficult, characterised by protests, civil disobedience, and armed resistance. Finally, in 1990, Nelson Mandela was released after 27 years, and negotiations between the government and the African National Congress (ANC) began. The negotiations ultimately led to adoption of a new constitution and the first democratic elections in 1994. On Freedom Day, South Africans celebrate their hard-won freedom and democracy. It is a day for reflecting on the past, remembering the sacrifices that were made, and looking forward to a brighter future. Events and activities are often organised throughout the country and diplomatic missions abroad to mark the occasion, including cultural performances, speeches by prominent figures, and community gatherings.
