



From 13-15 May, with BONDay kicking off on 12 May, the city of Durban in KwaZulu-Natal province will welcome delegates from all over the world to an unforgettable showcase of Africa's rich tourism offerings.

South African Tourism is fully committed to delivering a world-class event that not only Africa's diverse highlights experiences but also serves as a powerful platform for forging meaningful partnerships and driving business opportunities.

reinforcing commitment to partnership and collaboration and ensuring the seamless execution of this global travel trade event.

While there have been some early challenges in the planning, the team has doubled its efforts, working tirelessly to ensure that this year's show not only meets but surpasses expectations.

Since registrations for Africa's Travel Indaba opened in February, the response so far has been positive — with over 500 exhibitors from 19 African countries already registered and more than 650 hosted and non-hosted buyer applications received from across the globe. This impressive response sets the stage for an exceptional trade floor, brimming with opportunities to connect, collaborate, and celebrate Africa's tourism story.

Applications are still open for hosted and non-hosted buyers, and we also extend a special invite domestic and regional buyers to apply.

In the year of South Africa's G20 Presidency, we're proud to show the world our country's capability in hosting leading global events. Africa's Travel Indaba is more than a trade show — it's a celebration of our continent's vibrancy, resilience, and unmatched travel experiences.

South African Tourism Minister to Visit Ghana to Strengthen Bilateral Tourism Relations

Minister of Tourism, Patricia de Lille has embarked on a special outreach programme to Ghana from 26 – 28 March, aiming to strengthen tourism partnerships and promote cultural exchange between the two nations.

As part of the outreach programme, Minister de Lille will engage the Minister of Tourism, Culture and Creative Arts of Ghana, Honourable, Abla-Dzifa Gomashie, the South Africa-Ghana Chamber of Commerce, tourism trade, key media and tourism stakeholders to showcase South Africa as an attractive leisure and MICE (Meetings, Incentives, Conferences, and Exhibitions) destination.

The easing of visa regulations between the two countries in November 2023, was a progressive step that contributed to unlocking significant tourism potential.

It also marked a new chapter in strengthening tourism and trade, creating a seamless journey for Ghanaians to experience the beauty and diversity South Africa has to offer. This also opened doors for increased business, leisure, and cultural exchange.

"Ghana and the broader African continent are incredibly important markets for South Africa's tourism sector. This visit reaffirms our dedication to deepening partnerships and unlocking growth opportunities through meaningful collaboration. Ghana emerged as a standout performer, recording an exceptional 149.0% increase in tourist arrivals to South Africa in 2024 when compared to 2023. The number of Ghanaian visitors surged to 36,656, largely due to the introduction of a visa waiver in November 2023 coupled with the consistent marketing by South African Tourism, allowing citizens of both countries to travel to each other's country visa-free for up to 90 days within a year" Minister de Lille said.

Minister de Lille's visit holds added significance as it takes place in a year when South Africa proudly hosts the G20 Summit — a momentous occasion that highlights South Africa's growing influence on the global stage and its commitment to fostering meaningful partnerships across the African continent.

"We recognise the immense potential of intra-African travel to drive economic development, cultural exchange, and shared prosperity. It is for this reason that we are conducting this outreach mission to strengthen relations and partnerships with our counterparts in Ghana," Minister de Lille added.

The outreach programme will also enable senior officials from both countries to engage further on tourism bilateral issues and enhance relations.

African Stonehenge, Mpumalanga Province

Tucked away near eNtokozweni (aka Machadodorp), the African Stonehenge—also called Adam's Calendar—is a prehistoric rock formation believed to be a sun calendar. And get this: it's thought to be over 75,000 years old! Whether you're there for the history, the conspiracy theories, or just the insane views, it's a must-see spot.

4. Central Karoo, Western Cape Province

This year's show was bigger and bolder than before. More than 320 ever international buyers from over sixty countries gathered to connect collaborate, alongside 219 members of the media. 



Basic Quality Verification Training Expands to Gauteng: Elevating South Africa's Hospitality Standards

The Tourism Grading Council of South Africa (TGCSA) has broadened its reach by launching the Basic Quality Verification (BQV) training program in Gauteng. This exciting milestone was celebrated with an extensive compulsory training session held from 11-13 February 2025, at South African Tourism's head office in Sandton.

The BQV programme plays a vital role in TGCSA's commitment to ensuring that guest accommodation facilities, even those not meeting full grading criteria, still deliver quality and offer a welcoming experience for guests. Specifically designed for properties like homestays, guesthouses, bed and breakfasts (B&Bs), BQV ensures that these establishments are quality-assured, ready to host both local and international visitors with confidence.

Fifteen new evaluators took part in the training, gaining a deep understanding of the BQV standards and TGCSA's mission. The session was led by skilled trainers, including Ms. Trudy Lebepe, Gauteng's own assessor and co-trainer, who was instrumental in motivating and guiding the group. Her expertise helped trainees fully grasp the importance of maintaining high standards within the hospitality industry.

The culmination of the training involved a hands-on mock assessment at two premier locations: Black Brick and Hampton by hotels. This practical Hilton allowed participants to apply newfound knowledge real-world in refining essential scenarios, skills in housekeeping, technical evaluation, and service assessment.

This expansion of BQV into Gauteng marks an important step in advancing the overall quality of South Africa's accommodation industry. With the newly trained evaluators now ready to put their skills into action, the programme will help more properties meet key quality requirements, enriching the experience for visitors across the country.

As TGCSA continues to elevate hospitality standards nationwide, the successful roll-out of the BQV program in Gauteng is a promising sign of growth and development within South Africa's tourism sector, setting the stage for even greater improvements in the years ahead.
