#### **Conservation in Practice: Golden Gate Highlands National Park**



Nestled in the Drakensberg mountains, Golden Gate Highlands National Park shows how protected areas can balance visitor enjoyment with ecological responsibility. Beyond its iconic sandstone cliffs, the park's conservation-driven model supports diverse wildlife and fosters environmental awareness through guided tours and educational programmes.

Infrastructure choices reinforce the park's sustainability ethos: LED lighting, solar-heated water systems, and independent water and energy supplies reduce environmental impact. Community participation is also integral, with local residents employed in a range of roles and local suppliers contributing to the park's operations.

"It's very important in terms of sustainability that you have the right people, with the right training, in the right places," says Paddy Gordon, Park Manager, Golden Gate Highlands National Park.

## **Cultural Knowledge and Biodiversity: Setšong Tea Crafters**



In Limpopo, Setšong Tea Crafters demonstrates how small enterprises can merge cultural preservation with environmental stewardship. The female-owned business collaborates with rural cooperatives to craft teas from indigenous plants, ensuring economic opportunities remain embedded in local ecosystems and community knowledge.

Each tea blend celebrates Bapedi heritage and indigenous flora, while the company's inclusive business model highlights the role of rural women and youth in shaping sustainable value chains.

# Community Ownership and Ecological Living: Bulungula Lodge

Bulungula Lodge on the Eastern Cape coast is an example of community-owned tourism where sustainability forms the centre of operations. Fully off-grid, the lodge uses solar power, groundwater, compost toilets, and highly efficient water systems. Greywater irrigation, long-distance recycling efforts, and reforestation projects demonstrate a holistic environmental approach.



Its community programmes spanning education, health, livelihoods, and social cohesion show how tourism infrastructure can serve as both an environmental and social asset.

In the heart of South Africa's largest township, Lebo's Soweto Backpackers blends sustainability with cultural storytelling. Volunteer opportunities, after-school activities, and responsible tourism partnerships offer visitors ways to contribute to local development.

Local sourcing, communal cooking experiences, and guided heritage walks support small producers and

township entrepreneurs. Low-impact mobility options cycling, Tuk-Tuks, and walking tours, spread economic benefits across the community while reducing environmental footprint.

Solar installations reduce reliance on the national grid, while reusable water systems and local sourcing reduce waste and strengthen local economies.

Staff-led sustainability initiatives, such as a vegetable wastewater, demonstrate how employee creativity can

#### **Upcycled Innovation: Lilly Loompa**

In Paarl, Lilly Loompa transforms waste into homeware products, showing how sustainable design can drive both environmental and economic value. Using discarded glass, plastic, tin, and wood, the enterprise creates functional goods while generating local jobs.

Plans for a regional upcycling hub reflect the potential for collaboration between universities, entrepreneurs, and sustainability programmes. Through workshops and community outreach, Lilly Loompa raises



awareness about waste reduction and demonstrates how small businesses can influence broader environmental behaviour.
